#### **HEADLINES**

**RING-NECKED DUCK\*** the long-stay female remained until at least the 28<sup>th</sup>.

**LONG-TAILED DUCK\*** from Deeping High Bank (in Lincolnshire) one strayed into Cambridgeshire on the 29<sup>th</sup>.

**GREAT NORTHERN DIVER\*** Grafham the three immatures from December remained all month.

**CATTLE EGRET\*** Nene Washes (Eldernell) the long-stay individual present until at least the 28<sup>th</sup>. Seen far less often than in 2016, maybe because there are fewer sheep around.

**SPOONBILL** Burwell Fen 7 flew over on the 5<sup>th</sup>.

**ROUGH-LEGGED BUZZARD\*** Wryde Croft Thorney area from the 10<sup>th</sup> until at least the 14<sup>th</sup>.

GLAUCOUS GULL Ferry Meadows CP on the 7<sup>th</sup>, Grafham Water 2 immatures on the 8<sup>th</sup>, one on the 14<sup>th</sup>, Dogsthorpe Tip an immature on the 13<sup>th</sup>, Cambridge Research Park an immature from the 14<sup>th</sup>

until the end of the month seen at several places in the general area, 2 on the 15<sup>th</sup>, plus a possible new adult on the 21<sup>st</sup>, Littleport May Farm a 2 c.y. on the 28<sup>th</sup>.

ICELAND GULL Grafham Water on the 11<sup>th</sup>, Milton/Cottenham Long Drove and at Fen Drayton Lakes roost a 3 c.y.from the 19<sup>th</sup>, Dogsthorpe Tip an adult on the 21<sup>st</sup>.

#### Other records

All records below refer to the month at the head of the E-bulletin and where no numbers are given the record relates to single birds.

Where there is an asterisk after the name of the species this indicates that it is necessary to send a description to the County Recorder before the record will be accepted.

**Weather** The first few days were very cold with night frosts, followed by a short period of milder weather with rain, before returning to cold, high pressure weather, with frosts and low daytime temperatures but dry. The month ended with a couple of days of slightly warmer weather but many water bodies remained partially iced over.

**Whooper Swan** Ouse Washes: 200+ on the 1<sup>st</sup>, c3,500 on the 3<sup>rd</sup>, Burwell Fen: from the 5<sup>th</sup> counts of 23-30 throughout the month, Nene Washes: 982 on the 17<sup>th</sup>, Ferry Meadows CP: 7 on the 17<sup>th</sup>, Padney: 13 in a field with Mutes on the 24<sup>th</sup>, Wicken Fen: 35 on the 28<sup>th</sup> and 45+ on the 30<sup>th</sup>, Littleport May Farm: present all month maximum 1,034 on the 4<sup>th</sup>.

'Tundra' Bean Goose Ouse Washes: 2 on the 2<sup>nd</sup>, 4 on the 3<sup>rd</sup>, Nene Washes/Prior's Fen: 3 from the 14<sup>th</sup> until at least the 22<sup>nd</sup>, Cambridge Research Park: 2 on the 29<sup>th</sup> - 31<sup>st</sup>. Possibly involving the same individuals.

**Pink-footed Goose** Ouse Washes: on the 10<sup>th</sup>, Nene Washes: 4 on the 17<sup>th</sup>, March: a single on the 21<sup>st</sup>, Impington 45 flying over on the 25<sup>th</sup>.

**White-fronted Goose** Guyhirn: on the 2<sup>nd</sup>, Ouse Washes: from 8 on the 2<sup>nd</sup> up to a maximum of 48 on the 11<sup>th</sup> with 20+ remaining until the 22<sup>nd</sup> at least, Swaffham Prior Fen/BurwellFen/Upware/Wicken Fen: a group of 13-14 from the 2<sup>nd</sup> - 23<sup>rd</sup>, Paxton Pits: 18 flying

over on the 2<sup>nd</sup>, 18 -19 from the 5<sup>th</sup> until at least the 28<sup>th</sup>, Kingfishers Bridge: 4 on the 14<sup>th</sup>, March: 2 on the 21<sup>st</sup>, Cambridge Research Park: 3 on the 29<sup>th</sup>, Earith-Bluntisham 46 on the 28<sup>th</sup> and at Little Fen/Berry Fen on the 29<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup>.

Numbers since 2004 per annum are 2, 4, 2, 6, 12, 12, 14, 15, 15, 16, 22, 25 and in 2016: 28.

**Sparrowhawk** reported from: Burwell Fen, Great Shelford, Littleport May Farm (4), Ouse Fen, Paxton Pits (2 displaying) and Wicken Fen.

Buzzard reported from: Babraham, Brinkley, Burwell Fen, Fordham, Great Shelford, Little Eversden, Littleport May Farm (6+), March Farmers (2), Nene Washes (13), Newton (2), Ouse Fen (2), Ouse Washes, Paxton Pits (2), Swaffham Prior Fen (the pale individual still there), Wicken Fen The pale individual around the area of Swaffham Prior Fen/Burwell Fen looked very like a Roughlegged Buzzard, so much so that I turned my car around and when within about 20 yards and with a clear close-up view in binoculars I saw that it had bare legs, no feathering - a smooth-legged Buzzard. 

## Sand Martin Survey 2017

The last paper bulletin of the bird club included a short article announcing the intention to conduct a survey of Sand Martins in 2017. Further details can now be given.

The basic methodology will be for club members to record results during the course of their normal bird watching. Two forms are set out below reflecting the targets for the survey. One deals with general sightings of Sand Martins throughout the County and examines the numbers of birds and behaviour. The second looks at nesting colonies and is perhaps more challenging. One of the interesting features of these martins is that they can establish colonies remarkably quickly but appear to desert them equally quickly. Why? The survey may be able to throw some light on this behaviour. It does, though, lead to some problems as regards collecting information. If you find a colony it would be very helpful if you could survey it regularly throughout the breeding season, capturing the key information set out in the forms below. A few sites are well known but the club's annual report over the years mentions numerous instances of temporary colonies.

## Rare Breeding Birds

Following last year's conference, the club is keen to encourage increased recording of rare breeders. Targeted surveys at the right season can give important levels of evidence if the appropriate details are given with the record. Examples at this time of year include drumming Lesser-spotted Woodpeckers - and responses from second birds (females can also drum); calling Long-eared Owls and, let's get really optimistic and look for displaying Goshawks, following Conor's theme from the February meeting. While this is not currently a breeding species, Ravens are (at least 3 pairs now!) and these may also be seen displaying at remote locations so it really is worth looking at places where birders rarely go - isolated woods! The west of the county gives the best chance of Lesser-spots and Ravens while Gos may conceivably colonise the east first, if the Brecks ever produce a surplus stock. Long-eared Owls can turn up anywhere with a few conifers or scrub patches close to rough grassland with hunting opportunities. They avoid Tawny Owls so broad leaved woods tend not to hold them, but Brampton Wood is a possibility. Any displays or territorial activity now needs to be followed up as the breeding season progresses.

Next month early waders will be worth looking for - Stone Curlews, Avocets and Little Ringed Plover.

## Looking for the Goshawk - the Lost Raptor by Conor Jameson

I wrote *Looking for the Goshawk* because I was seeking answers to questions, prompted by an unexpected encounter. I thought I knew this bird, but this incident with the Goshawk challenged me. My mind raced with questions.

Why was I so drawn to this animal?

Why has it been less celebrated by conservationists than other, no more nor less charismatic species?

Why do certain people love it, as I do, and others hate it?

How can such a large, dramatic species be so hard to find?

Why has its population growth apparently stalled for many years, with little or no comment made on this? Or could there be many more out there than we think?

How can the Goshawk inhabit city centres in some countries, when we have always told ourselves that it is a bird of remotest conifer forest in the British Isles and North America?

Above all, perhaps, why had no one written this book before?

I became fixated with these questions, and the idea that the Goshawk could and should be anywhere, at any time, in the environment around me. Why was I not seeing it? What does its presence or absence tell us about us?

I developed the sense that this is arguably the finest, best adapted, most versatile and rapacious bird we have; the apex, alpha predator of our landscapes... And we aren't even missing it. This was once the bird they measured a man or a forest's value by. Today, it has vanished from the cultural memory. I set out to try to change this.

This book is, in the end, a book about us. I feel privileged to have had the opportunity to relay these stories, to address the above questions, and I hope I have done them - and above all this extraordinary bird whose life history is so wrapped up in our own - the justice they deserve. Conor Mark Jameson has worked in conservation for 25 years, and is the author of Silent Spring Revisited, Looking for the Goshawk, and Shrewdunnit: The Nature Files. He now lives in north Cambs.

#### Feathered Fiends? Reasons to love your neighbourhood gulls by Viola Ross-Smith

Viola Ross-Smith is Science Communications Manager at BTO, responsible for spreading the good word about the BTO's research through print publications, social media and as many other channels as possible. Before taking on this role in 2015, Viola worked on gulls for 10 years, starting during her PhD and continuing in her previous job at the BTO, as an ecologist. She is still involved in seabird tracking and research, and sits on the Executive Committee of the Seabird Group.

#### Reclaiming South Georgia by Tony Martin

Two centuries ago, rats and mice were inadvertently introduced to the UK overseas territory of South Georgia by sealers and whalers. Over time, these unwelcome guests ate their way through most of the island's wildlife, reducing the bird population by more than 90%. They threatened the extinction of an endemic bird and fundamentally changing the entire ecosystem of this globally important sub-Antarctic wildlife refuge. Tony Martin led a 6-year project to eradicate these invaders on behalf of the South Georgia Heritage Trust, using 3 helicopters, 300 tonnes of bait, £8m and a team of 40 people. This talk will explore what was involved in carrying out the world's largest rodent eradication project on a remote, glacier-encrusted island, the very encouraging results so far, and what lies ahead before South Georgia can finally be declared rodent free. Tony Martin is Professor of Animal Conservation at the University of Dundee, and currently under secondment to the South Georgia Heritage Trust as Director of the South Georgia Habitat Restoration Project. He was previously a researcher at the Sea Mammal Research Unit and then the British Antarctic Survey in Cambridge for 30 years, working on cetaceans and other aquatic

vertebrates, especially in polar regions and the Amazon. At home in Cambridgeshire, Tony's garden has grown alarmingly, now hosting breeding avocets, harriers, kingfishers and sand martins.
