Welcome to the March / April 2015 Edition

RECENT BIRD REPORTS

The records in this bulletin are unchecked and may be revised at a later date. An asterisk after the name of the species indicates that it is necessary to send a description to the County Recorder before the record will be accepted. Some species are 'reported from' to give an indication of distribution. Some entries (particularly wildfowl) have maxima given when a number of counts have been received. Where no numbers are given the record relates to single birds.

March – April Weather. March was a rather cold month with winds predominantly from the north or east, with only a slight window in the second week, when the wind was from the south. Undoubtedly this will have inhibited the arrival of most migrants. In March 2014 there were 'several' records of Swallows, 5 records of Wheatear from 10th, and Spotted Redshank, House Martin and Sedge warbler all reported. The month ended with strong winds but only a Kittiwake or two blown in.

The first few days of April remained cold and then after then 5th a warmer spell with southerly winds arrived and with it the first burst of migrants. The month continued with more warm days, interspersed with the occasional cooler day but hardly any rainfall; high pressure dominated resulting in the odd frost or misty morning (for those up early enough to see). According to Met Office records this was an exceptionally warm April. The month ended with a change to wetter and cooler weather.

March - April Headlines

GREEN-WINGED TEAL* Mar: Ouse Washes RSPB on $28^{th} - 29^{th}$, and to 9^{th} Apr; seventeen previous records, the last in 2011.

RING-NECKED DUCK* Mar: Ouse Washes male on $16^{th} - 21^{st}$; seventeen records, the last in 2014. **GLOSSY IBIS*** Mar: one at Fen Drayton Lakes from $1^{st} - 3^{rd}$ then presumably the same Ouse Washes/ Chain Corner on 7^{th} and RSPB reserve on $20^{th} - 28^{th}$. Apr: Fen Drayton Lakes one present all month. **SPOONBILL** Mar: Ouse Washes on $20^{th} - 22^{nd}$.

BLACK-WINGED STILT* Apr: Nene Washes 3 briefly on 16th.

ROUGH-LEGGED BUZZARD* Mar: Holme Fen area, the over-wintering bird reported until 5^{th} . ICELAND GULL Mar: Grafham Water an adult on 1^{st} , Witcham Gravel one on 2^{nd} and $6^{th} - 7^{th}$. LESSER SPOTTED WOODPECKER Mar: Cam Washes/Upware one 'nearby' on 22^{nd} . Apr: Birds remained on territory at two traditional sites.

Barnacle Goose Mar: Coton footpath 2 on 4th then 10 – 11 on 5th, Trumpington/Clay Farm 2 on 16th then 11 on 20th, Paxton Pits on 20th and 23rd. **Apr:** Hemingford on 7th, Lt Shelford 11 on 7th.

Egyptian Goose Mar: Burwell Fen 2 on 4th, Fen Drayton Lakes 3 on 14th, Paxton Pits 2 on 20th, Trumpington/Clay Farm 2 on 30th. Apr: Paxton Pits 1 – 2 on several dates, Fen Drayton Lakes 2 adults with 6 goslings (one of which is probably a Greylag) on 19th, Ouse Fen 7 on 26th.

Shelduck Mar: Burwell Fen 6 – 10 throughout the month, Bassenhally Moor Farm 60 on 10th, Cam Washes / Upware 14 on 8th. Apr: Ouse Washes 45 on 1st, Burwell Fen 38 on 7th and 9 pairs on 24th, Wicken Fen 23 on 20th, Paxton Pits max 4 on 22nd, Cam Washes 13 on 28th.

Wigeon Mar: Nene Washes 5600 on 9th. **Apr:** Fen Drayton Lakes 8 on 12th, Burwell Fen a drake on 24th, Paxton Pits 2 still on 28th.

Gadwall Mar: Nene Washes 428 on 9th, Wicken Fen maximum 180 on 9th. **Apr:** Burwell Fen 25 on 7th and 60 on 26th, Cam Washes 22 on 28th.

Teal Mar: Grafham Water 518 on 8th, Nene Washes 1707 on 9th, Wicken Fen 106 on 12th. **Apr:** Kingfishers Bridge 59 on 4th, Ouse Washes 506 on 11th, Cam Washes 58 on 28th.

Mallard Mar: Nene Washes 366 on 9th, Wicken Fen maximum 63 on 9th. Apr: Holme Fen 64 on 8th. Pintail Mar: Cam Washes/Upware 13 on 8th, Wicken Fen 4 on 13th, Ouse Washes RSPB 120+ on 15th. Apr: Ouse Washes 80 on 2nd, Paxton Pits 17th and 20th, Cam Washes 26th – 28th.

Garganey Mar: First report at Ouse Washes on 8th, Wicken Fen a pair on 10th, and Ouse Washes a pair from 14th. **Apr:** reported from Berry Fen, Burwell Fen, Ely BF, Isleham Washes, Ouse Washes, Paxton Pits, Tubney Fen and Wicken Fen.

Shoveler Mar: Kingfishers Bridge 57 on 3rd, Burwell Fen c50 on 6th, Cam Washes/Upware 50 on 8th, Grafham Water 61 on 8th, Wicken Fen 85 on 9th, Nene Washes 290 on 9th. **Apr:** Burwell Fen 149 on 9th, Berry Fen 189 on 14th.

Red-crested Pochard Apr: Paxton Pits a pair on 2nd – 4th, Bainton GP 4 on 20th, Buckden GP 4 on 20th. **Pochard** Mar: Ouse Fen 32 on 22nd, Kingfishers Bridge 20 on 3rd, Burwell Fen 11 on 27th, Fen Drayton Lakes 27 on 18th. Apr: Burwell Fen 24 on 7th, Fen Drayton Lakes 4 on 25th.

Tufted Duck Mar: Trumpington/Clay Farm 12 on 2nd, Grafham Water 92 on 9th, Paxton Pits 60 on 16th. Apr: Burwell Fen 10 on 7th, Trumpington/Clay Farm 24 – 26 all month, Waterbeach GP 64 on 18th.

Scaup Mar: Ouse Washes RSPB a female on 15th then a male 18th – 20th, Mepal Outdoor Centre a male on 28th. Apr: Fen Drayton Lakes on 23rd – 27th.

Common Scoter Mar: Ferry Meadows CP 3 males on 19th, Grafham Water 2 on 20th and a male on 26th. **Apr:** Bainton GP 2 on 16th, Grafham Water 3 on 26th.

Goldeneye Mar: Holme Fen on 7th, Grafham Water 66 on 8th and 25 on 31st, Ouse Washes RSPB 2 on 15th, Fen Drayton Lakes maximum c20 on 14th. Apr: Paxton Pits 17 on 2nd, still 2 drakes on 17th with one on 23rd, Fen Drayton Lakes maximum 12 on 9th.

Smew Mar: Barleycraft GP 21 on 1st, Bainton GP on 12th. Apr: Ouse Fen 2 on 5th.

Goosander Mar: Paxton Pits max 7 on 15th, Grafham Water 8 on 8th, Ferry Meadows CP on 12th and 24th, Fen Drayton Lakes a pair on 15th – 18th and one on 27th. Apr: Ferry Meadows CP on 21st and 29th. Ruddy Duck Mar: at an undisclosed fenland site on 20th. Apr: at a south Cambs site on 13th.

Gamebirds

Grey Partridge Mar: Burwell Fen on 8th, Aldreth 9 on 16th, Nine Wells 26 on 20th. Apr: Pymoor a pair on 13th, Grafham Water 5 on 17th, Comberton 8 on 14th, Melbourn 6 pairs on 30th.

Quail Apr: Comberton on 24th, the first of the year.

Divers, cormorants, egrets and herons and grebes

Great Northern Diver* Mar & Apr: Paxton Pits, the long-stay bird from February present throughout. **Cormorant Mar:** Nene Washes (Eldernell) 79 on 9th, Barleycraft GP 60 on 27th. Apr: Ouse Washes (Sutton Gault) 87 on 2nd, Paxton Pits 87 on 19th.

Bittern Mar: Kingfishers Bridge on 3rd, Woodwalton Fen on 4th. **Apr:** reported from at least three sites. **Little Egret Mar:** reported from Burwell Fen (5), Diddington, Fen Drayton Lakes (3), Nene Washes (14), Ouse Washes Earith to the RSPB reserve 40 on 14th then a roost of 120 on 19th, Paxton Pits (5), Trumpington/Clay Farm, Wicken Fen (5). **Apr:** at Burwell Fen (7), Cambridge, Fen Drayton Lakes (2), Ouse Washes (15), Paxton Pits (2), Wicken Fen (3), and Nene Washes (Eldernell) 27 on 8th. **Great White Egret Mar:** Wicken Fen on 7th, Ouse Washes on 20th and 22nd. **Apr:** Hinchingbrooke CP on 1st, Ouse Washes an adult on 2nd and a second (immature) bird on 6th, Wicken Fen 2 on 24th and 25th, Ouse Fen on 27th, Fen Drayton Lakes on 27th. *This species has been reported in every month since April 2014 (apart from November), so no longer merits a place in the headlines.*

Grey Heron Mar: Wicken Fen 7 on 10th and two nests; other active nests at Berry Fen and Stapleford. Little Grebe Mar: Trumpington/Clay Farm 5 on 2nd, Fowlmere NR 2 on 6th, Wicken Fen a pair on 10th. Apr: Burwell Fen 20 on 26th, Trumpington/Clay Farm 3 all month.

Great Crested Grebe Mar: Grafham Water 40 on 8th, Drysides BP 15 on 28th, Trumpington/Clay Farm on 2nd, Wicken Fen 4 on 9th, Fen Drayton Lakes 7 on 18th. **Apr:** Ferry Meadows 30 on 7th, and Cambridge a pair with young on 21st.

Black-necked Grebe Mar: Fen Drayton Lakes on 16th. **Apr:** reported from 2 sites.

Raptors

Red Kite Mar: Stilton 6 on 1st, Kingfishers Bridge 2 on 3rd, Castor Hanglands on 8th, Paxton Pits 3 on 15th, Huntingdon on 13th, Ouse Washes on 20th, Cambridge/Addenbrooke's on 25th, Thriplow on 27th. Apr: Hamerton 8 on 3rd, Paxton Pits maximum 3 on 5th, Wyton on 6th, Ouse Fen on 9th, Wicken Fen on 11th, Grafham Water 3 on 17th, Mepal on 24th, Fen Drayton Lakes on 25th, Borrough Green on 27th. Marsh Harrier Mar: Kingfishers Bridge 2 on 3rd, Burwell Fen 2 on 6th, Woodwalton Fen 4+ on 7th, Ouse Washes on 7th, Cam Washes/Upware on 8th, Wicken Fen 5 on 31st, Nene Washes 10 on 25th, Fen Drayton Lakes on 27th. Apr: reported from several localities including most of the above, maxima Wicken Fen (8+) and Woodwalton Fen (10+).

Hen Harrier Mar: Ouse Washes on 7th and 14th, Cam Washes/Upware a ringtail on 8th, Ely BF a ringtail on 11th, Nene Washes a male on 12th and 2 males on 25th, Wicken Fen a male and a ringtail on 21st, Burwell Fen a ringtail on 27th. Apr: Wicken Fen 8 on 9th, a ringtail until 24th at least, Nene Washes a male on 14th, Ouse Washes an immature male on 28th.

Sparrowhawk Mar: reported from Burwell Fen, Huntingdon, Cambridge, Paxton Pits and Wicken Fen. **Apr:** also reported from Cam Washes, Chippenham Fen, Houghton Meadows, and Wyton. **Buzzard Mar:** reported from 17 sites from Great Shelford to Castor Hanglands, maxima Chippenham Fen (8), Cottenham (4), and Paxton Pits (8+). **Apr:** similarly widespread including Burwell Fen (3), Ouse Fen (8), Paxton Pits (18), Swaffham Prior Fen/Tubney Fen area (11), Wicken Fen (5) and Wyton (4). **Osprey Mar:** Ferry Meadows CP on 24th. **Apr:** Eaton Socon a bird flying north on 6th, Grafham Water on 8th, St Neots on 9th (this bird had been ringed as a juvenile at Rutland Water in 2011), Grafham

Water on 22nd and on 26th, Ouse Washes on 22nd, Paxton Pits on 26th.

Rails and crane

Water Rail Mar: reported from 8 sites. Apr: reported from 10 sites including Wicken Fen 10+ on 9th. Coot Mar: Berry Fen 197 on 8th, Nene Washes 352 on 9th. Apr: Bradley Fen 258 on 28th. Common Crane Apr: Reported from 6 sites, several just as fly-over birds.

Waders

Avocet Mar: Paxton Pits 2 on 8th, Cam Washes/Upware 4 on 7th and 2 on 8th, Grafham Water 8 on 8th, Paxton Pits on 13th, Ouse Washes max 33 on 29th, Cam Washes/Upware 31 on 20th. Apr: Groups on passage in early April were followed by paired birds settling to breed at several locations.

Oystercatcher Mar: Paxton Pits 2-7 on $1^{st}-22^{nd}$, Burwell Fen 2 on 4^{th} , Fen Drayton Lakes 1-4 all month, Woodwalton Fen 2 on 7^{th} , Cam Washes/Upware 2 on 8^{th} , Ouse Washes 9 on 15^{th} , Burwell Fen 2 on 2^{rth} . Apr: at all the above sites, maxima Paxton Pits 5 on 2^{nd} , Fen Drayton Lakes 9 on 12^{th} , Isleham Washes a pair on 9^{th} , Cam Washes 2 on $26^{th}-28^{th}$.

Golden Plover Mar: Soham c300 on 3rd, Four Balls Farm 500 on 7th, Nene Washes 1800 on 9th, Ouse Washes 194 on 15th, Trumpington c250 on 20th, Glatton 160 on 21st. Apr: Comberton 65 on 15th, Alwalton 100 on 17th.

Grey Plover Mar: Ouse Washes RSPB on 15^{th} . Apr: Paxton Pits on $16^{th} - 17^{th}$ then 2 on $18^{th} - 19^{th}$ and a single on $20^{th} - 21^{st}$, Ouse Washes single on $17^{th} - 21^{st}$.

Lapwing Mar: Burwell Fen c250 on 6th, Wicken Fen c250 on 10th. **Apr:** Burwell Fen 11 on 7th, Fowlmere NR 2 pairs on 17th, Fen Drayton Lakes 45 on 26th.

Little Ringed Plover Mar: The first at Paxton Pits on the 11th, then 1 – 2 for rest of month. Apr: Groups on passage early on were followed by paired birds settling to breed at several locations.

Ringed Plover Mar: The first at Paxton Pits 2 on the 4th, then 6 on 17th, and Ouse Washes 7 on 15th.

Apr: Beeby's Pit 14 on 1st, and at Cam Washes (3), Paxton Pits (5) and Trumpington/Clay Farm (2).

Whimbrel Apr: Lt Shelford 7th, the first of the year, Nene Washes 16th, then Paxton Pits on 20th, Fen Drayton Lakes on 23rd – 26th; then on 26th an influx with birds reported from Berry Fen, Burwell Fen (3), Cam Washes, Ferry Meadows CP (5), Grafham Water and Ouse Washes (2), and Ouse Washes 2 on 28th. A light passage so far this year with around 20 birds between 20th and 28th.

Curlew Mar: Burwell Fen on 4th and 8th, Ferry Meadows CP a flyover on 12th, Paxton Pits on 13th, then 5 on 14th and a single on 15th, Ouse Washes RSPB on 15th and 21st, and 2 on 20th at Sutton Gault. **Apr:** Berry Fen flyover on 7th, Burwell Fen on 24th, Ouse Fen 2 on 27th.

Black-tailed Godwit Mar: Ouse Washes 1100 on 8th, up to 3500 on 16th – 21st. Apr: Ouse Washes maximum 1300 on 2nd, Berry Fen max 200 on 5th, Isleham Washes 10 on 9th, Sutton Gault 57 on 11th, Wicken Fen 4 on 11th, Fen Drayton Lakes max 15 on 13th, Burwell Fen max 10 on 15th.

Bar-tailed Godwit Apr: Paxton Pits & Grafham Water each with 2 on 17^{th} were the first of the year, thereafter Paxton Pits 5 on 18^{th} and 1-2 from $19^{th}-30^{th}$, Cam Washes on 26^{th} .

Turnstone Apr: Paxton Pits on $6^{th} - 14^{th}$; the same or another on 27^{th} .

Knot Mar: Paxton Pits on 21st. Apr: Ouse Washes on 3rd.

Ruff Mar: Ouse Washes/Chain Corner 20+ on 7th, Ouse Washes RSPB 54+ on 8th, then Earith to RSPB 130 on 15th. **Apr:** Paxton Pits on 2nd and 12th then 3 on 23rd, Ouse Washes maximum 119+ on 9th, Fen Drayton Lakes 1 – 6 from 9th, Berry Fen 45 on 14th, Sutton Gault c60 on 11th, Cam Washes 10 on 26th. **Sanderling Apr:** Fen Drayton Lakes on 23rd, the first of the year, Grafham Water 2 on 26th.

Dunlin Mar: Paxton Pits maximum 9 on 14th, Nene Washes 127 on 9th, Ouse Washes 82 on 15th. **Apr:** Paxton Pits 1 – 3 all month max 28 on 25th, Sutton Gault 9 on 11th, Ouse Washes 4 on 12th, Grafham Water 7 on 26th, Burwell Fen 2 on 16th and 3 on 26th, Cam Washes 7 on 26th.

Common Sandpiper Apr: Ferry Meadows CP on 16th, the first reported this year, Paxton Pits on 17th and 1 – 3 on 20th – 29th, Ferry Meadows CP on 20th, 2 on 26th, Fen Drayton Lakes 1 – 2 on 22nd – 29th.

Green Sandpiper Mar: Cam Washes/Upware 2 on 7th, Grafham Water 3 on 8th, Paxton Pits maximum 2 on 25th. Apr: reported from 10 sites, including Tanholt GP 4 on 11th, Kingfishers Bridge 3 on 16th.

Spotted Redshank Apr: Ouse Washes on 12th, the first of the year, Fen Drayton Lakes on 22nd – 23rd, Cam Washes 4 on 23rd, Ouse Washes on 26th.

Greenshank Apr: Nene Washes on 16th, the first of the year, Paxton Pits on 17th, Grafham Water on 17th, Ouse Washes on 18th, 3 on 22nd and 2+ on 26th, Isleham Washes on 19th, 4 on 20th and then 1 – 2 until 30th, Fen Drayton Lakes on 23rd – 24th, Cam Washes 6 on 28th, Offord Cluny on 28th.

Wood Sandpiper Apr: Fowlmere NR on 23rd, Cam Washes on 26th.

Redshank Mar: Nene Washes 133 on 9th, Fen Drayton Lakes 250 over on 17th, Paxton Pits maximum 6 on 25th, Ouse Washes/Chain Corner 26 on 15th. Apr: reported from Cam Washes (9), Fen Drayton Lakes (8), Isleham Washes (2), Ouse Washes (20), Paxton Pits (9+), Tanholt GP (7) and Wicken Fen (10).

Jack Snipe Mar: Kingfishers Bridge on 3rd, Kings Dyke NR on 6th and 18th, Trumpington 2 on 26th, Paxton Pits on 21st, Ouse Washes RSPB 4 on 28th.

Woodcock Mar: Monks Wood 'several' on 5th, Ditton Park Wood 5 on 9th, Ferry Meadows CP on 11th. **Apr:** Kings Dyke NR 2 on 6th, Wicken Fen 2 roding on 14th.

Snipe Mar: Paxton Pits maximum 17 on 17th, Cam Washes/Upware 120 on 7th, Burwell Fen 3 on 27th, Ouse Washes 21 on 28th. **Apr:** Fen Drayton Lakes 8 on 9th, Isleham Washes 2 on 9th, Wicken Fen 5 in a field near Priory Farm on 21st, Burwell Fen 17 on 24th, Berry Fen 2 on 26th, Cam Washes 12 on 26th.

Terns and gulls

Little Tern Apr: Fen Drayton Lakes on 26th, the first for the year. **Black Tern** Apr: Grafham Water 1 on 16th, then Nene Washes 6 on 21st, Grafham Water (7), Paxton Pits (8), Fen Drayton Lakes (4), all on 23rd, thereafter singles at Fen Drayton Lakes.

Sandwich Tern Apr: Fen Drayton Lakes on 24th, the first of the year.

Common Tern Apr: Ferry Meadows CP on 6th, the first of the year, Fen Drayton Lakes 2 on 9th, Ferry Meadows CP 3 on 10th, Paxton Pits 5 on 11th, then a general arrival. Large counts: Paxton Pits maximum 90+ on 30th, Fen Drayton Lakes maximum 60 on 26th.

Arctic Tern Apr: Ouse Washes on 18th, the first record of the year, then Grafham Water on 20th (see table), Fen Drayton Lakes 2 on 21st and a single on 22nd and 25th, 3 on 26th, Paxton Pits c10 on 21st and again on 26th then 2 on 28th, Ferry Meadows CP 12+ on 22nd a single on 23rd.

Kittiwake Mar: Grafham Water on 7th, 2 on 21st and a single on 31st. Apr: Fen Drayton Lakes on 29th. Black-headed Gull Mar: Paxton Pits c1000 on 12th, Melbourn 600 on 22nd, Burwell Fen c320 on 27th, Trumpington/Clay Farm 150+ all month, maximum 210 on 16th. Apr: Peterborough Millennium Bridge 500 on 7th, Kingfishers Bridge 550 on 26th, Burwell Fen 426 on 24th.

Little Gull Apr: Ferry Meadows CP on 10th, 2 adults on 20th and a single on 23rd, Grafham Water 2 adults on 15th, 6 on 17th, 41 on 23rd and one on 26th – 28th, Fen Drayton Lakes 2 on 17th – 23rd, Paxton Pits 2 adults on 22nd.

Mediterranean Gull Mar: Grafham Water on 8th, Ouse Washes 2 on 21st, Paxton Pits a 1st winter on 22nd and 2 on 24th. On 30th March, one of the two fledged, colour-ringed Med Gulls from

Cambridgeshire in 2014 was sighted in southern Morocco; this is the most southerly wintering Med Gull ever observed. Apr: Ferry Meadows CP a 2nd- summer on 3rd – 9th, Paxton Pits on 6th 18th and 20th.

Common Gull Mar: Hinxton 12 on 3rd, Fen Drayton Lakes 47 on 20th, Melbourn 700 on ploughed land on 22nd. Apr: Fowlmere NR 20 over on 19th.

Yellow-legged Gull Mar: Grafham Water 3 on 8th, Fen Drayton Lakes on 14th, Burwell Fen and Milton Tip on 26th.

Caspian Gull Mar: Witcham Gravel on 6th, Grafham Water on 8th, Milton Tip on 20th, Kingfishers

Great Black-backed Gull Apr: Tanholt GP on 7th. Kingfishers Bridge 6 on 20th.

Doves, owls, kingfisher

Stock Dove Mar: Holme Fen 80 on 8th. Apr: Fen Drayton Lakes c45 on 26th.

Turtle Dove Mar: Aldreth one on present 9th, the same date on which presumably the same bird arrived in 2014, remarkable then and remarkable now; also Soham on 15th. Apr: Holland Wood on 21st, Mepal on 24th, Fowlmere NR 2 singing on 30th.

The Bob Scott Memorial Appeal: What has happened and what should we do next?

Growing concern for our environment and its effects on our birds and other wildlife began for Bob and me way back in the late 1980s. Our own travelling experiences after we retired and the rapid decline in our spring and summer migrants only added to our fears. A talk at the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) Conference by a person who had been ringing in the Sahel area, moved to another site and returned to the original place a week later to find not a tree or bush standing, only added to our fears. We started then to look for ways of helping, but then sadly Bob became very ill and passed on. It was some three months after his death that I decided to honour his memory with something positive and worthwhile, hence the Appeal.

With the aid of a group of friends and past colleagues I set about raising money. Birdlife International, through their staff member Peter Hendley, kindly offered to be my bankers and we quickly raised £10,000. This was about to be sent out to Burkina Faso, one of the eleven nations that make up the Sahel, to assist the Dutch, who were already working there reinstating/recreating scrub and reedbed habitat on the edge of the desert, when severe drought hit and fighting between the military and civilians forced the Dutch to return home. Everything was put on hold.

Colin Jackson of A Rocha Kenya, the religious conservation organisation with branches in various parts of the world, informed Graham Hirons, a good friend who was on holiday in Kenya, of the destruction of the Arabuko-Sokoke Forest – which used to stretch from the Somalian border south to Tanzania, some 10360 square kilometres but now down to less than 400 square kilometres - and of the new threat to the remainder from Pineapple Growers. This forest acts as an important area for eastern migrants on their journeys north and south. Some birds, like Spotted Flycatchers, Shrikes and Golden Orioles may stay throughout the wintering period whilst others like European Rollers use it for several weeks whilst travelling. There have been counts of over 2,000 rollers on occasions. Its rich biodiversity includes a concentration of endemic and endangered flora and fauna. Clarke's Weaver, Sokoke Scops Owl, Sokoke Pipit and Golden-Rumped Elephant shrew are just a few of its gems. If the forest goes completely, so does the food supply and resting area of migrants and habitat for many other inter African species. We subsequently purchased 219 acres of land which is now known as the Kirosa Scott Reserve. Katana, an A Rocha staff member, lives in the village so is able to ensure that the land stays fully protected as both he and his relatives are in the immediate area. They have also been looking out for further land that we may be able to purchase and that is our next move. I hope, within the next few weeks, to be able to send a further £10,000 to A Rocha for the purchase of yet more land, hopefully making the area up to 500 acres.

We then hope to turn back to Burkina Faso to assist the habitat there just as soon as we can get back into the area or, with the help of BirdLife, find an equally important area needing our support and funding. If we can achieve both of these aims we will be giving protection to both Eastern and Western migrants in a changing world, and the death of Bob Scott at the age of 70 will not have been in vain.

Action for Swifts

Action for Swifts (AfS) - was the brainchild of Jake Allsop and Chris Mead. Set up in 1995, it became a group of like-minded Swift enthusiasts concerned about the diminishing numbers of swifts seen in our skies. It is thought that one of the biggest causes in their decline is the loss of nest sites; old buildings knocked down, old pantile type house roofs replaced with modern designs that have no access, and new projects constructed with no thought of access for Swifts.

So Action for Swifts is living up to its name and trying to create more opportunities for swifts to breed locally; it co-operates with other groups of swift enthusiasts country-wide to share expertise. Since its inception it has taken part in many projects locally and further afield. The majority of these involved the making and erecting of nest boxes in church towers and in schools, as well as private houses.

The total number of boxes so far placed in or on building now stands at over one thousand in this county, and over 5000 Swift boxes have been sold by John Stimpson of Wilburton using a Dutch design provided by AfS.

Action for Swifts worked closely with Cambridge City Council and the artist Andrew Merritt to create the Cambridge Swift Tower on Pye Fen, (Logan's Meadow Local Nature Reserve in East Chesterton). It advises architects and builders and individuals on making building projects swift-friendly, and has built and erected a Swift Tower for the Trumpington Community Orchard.

It promotes and assists at events to encourage more people to look after their Swifts such as at Worlington Church, St Neots Church and Fulbourn Community Swifts project, (see below for the dates

and venues). It has produced and published a delightful booklet about Swifts aimed mainly at children and called "I am a Swift; I am in trouble."

It even has a rehabilitation programme where experienced rehabbers rescue, rear and release Swifts that may have fallen to the ground, usually young birds straight out of the nest. A high rate of success has been achieved in this.

There is little recording done in Cambs on the breeding numbers of even 'familiar' birds like Little Egret, Marsh Harrier, Pochard and Shoveler...and with the ducks even just counting males in summer is very helpful".

Other Events

26th – 28th June 2015 - Weekend course: "Bees, flies and flowers: the ecology of pollination and why it matters"

Are you worried about the plight of wild bees and other pollinators? These insects provide a crucial service pollinating crops and wildflowers. Yet there is widespread concern about their decline. This course will teach you how to identify and monitor common pollinators such as bumblebees and hoverflies, how to measure their importance to flowers, and how you can contribute to pollinator conservation.

You will learn to assess your own garden for its value to pollinators. You will try out practical techniques used in pollination ecology, including preparing a pollen sample for microscopic examination and measuring insect behaviour. Expect to go home with an entirely different view of flowerbeds and road verges. The course is taught by Dr Lynn Dicks, Research Fellow at the University of Cambridge Department of Zoology. Lynn has a PhD in the ecology of pollinating insects, awarded from Cambridge in 2002 and has continued to work as a science writer and broadcaster for 10 years. She is keen that as many people as possible notice and enjoy the diversity of wild pollinators that busy themselves around us every summer.

This weekend course takes place at the Cambridge University Institute of Continuing Education's home, Madingley Hall. The course costs £250 which includes lunch & dinner over the weekend, refreshments, and tuition. It is also possible to stay at Madingley Hall's B&B over the weekend at an additional cost starting from £50 per night, subject to availability.
